A Time for Thanks

Sometimes it can be challenging living in Illinois and specifically in the more conservative areas such as Bloomington/Normal. A particular frustration lies with the elected officials who represent us in Springfield and Washington. Sometimes it feels as if we win our equality *in spite of* them rather than because of them.

Happily, recent actions by two of our elected officials merit our thanks and support.

Back in February Jason Barickman, state senator whose 53rd district includes much of Bloomington/ Normal, voted in favor of the Religious Freedom and Marriage Fairness Act, legislation that would ensure equal marriage rights for same-sex Barickman was the only couples. Republican senator to support the bill, and there have been rumors that he will be targeted by conservative Republicans for defeat in the next election. Please take a moment out of your summertime activities to thank Sen. Barickman for his support:

On the federal level, the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) was introduced in April to the 113th Congress. ENDA was first introduced in Congress back in 1994, but was defeated by one vote in 1996 and languished in committees during the Bush presidency.

The legislation would provide basic protections against workplace discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity. Currently 29 states offer no protections against such discrimination.

Illinois' Republican senator, Mark Kirk, was one of four co-sponsors of the new version of ENDA which was introduced on April 25. His support for ENDA is consistent with his voting record which includes supporting the repeal of Don't Ask, Don't Tell and signing on as a co-sponsor of the Safe Schools Improvement Act.

Like Barickman, Sen. Kirk is more moderate on social issues and his support for ENDA has not gone unnoticed by his conservative colleagues who hope to unseat him when he is up for re-election in 2016.

B-N LGBT Landmark Celebrates 20 Years

Jan Lancaster makes even a bar on a Thursday afternoon feel like



someone's living room. She offers water and seating and settles into her own chair for a friendly chat. The moniker "momma" is a fitting one to a woman who has unofficially "adopted" dozens of Bloomington-Normal lgbt youth and adults alike over the years.

Lancaster's landmark Bloomington bar, the Bistro, will celebrate its 20th anniversary this July, and this milestone is observed with a mixture of joy and awe. Lancaster Bloomingtonrecalls Normal of 1993 as a place different than the community today. She describes the atmosphere around town the bar first when

opened and talks about patrons who worried about parking their cars in front of the establishment for fear of being outed. Lancaster also casually talks about picketers from the Christian Coalition receiving and calls from hate-monger Rev. Fred Phelps of the Westboro **Baptist** Church. If things like this worried Lancaster, she doesn't show it. these brushing off events as insignificant. Her passion and heart are reserved for the clientele she has served, helped, nurtured and cheered on for the past two decades.

Lancaster admits

that owning a bar is not an easy occupation, especially since patron loyalty can sometimes be fleeting. She

acknowledges that the clientele of the Bistro is uncommonly true to establishment, adds that the but changing times, while wonderful on fronts, can sometimes be bad for business. She explains that when she first opened the bar, she met several people whose families had disowned them. who lived in fear of being outed. Now, she describes these problems as far less common, but as a result, the safe haven that she and the employees of the Bistro have worked hard to create,
